Tour Snapshot

Travel from the 19th century to modern-day Belgrade on this tour that mashes up history, culture, architecture, and food into an all-in-one morning! You'll grab coffee in the city's oldest tavern, learn about Serbian architecture and important figures, visit a market where you can taste local products, and finish it off with a street food-style lunch in the city's best sausage joint.

Highlights

- Wander the city's districts and learn about the architectural style that emerged between the wars
- Hear the stories of some of Serbia's most important historical figures
- Stop at the oldest tavern in town for a traditional Serbian coffee and *rakia*
- Shop the local market and sample farm-fresh treats like *kaymak* cheese
- Grab street food sausage for lunch at the best spot in town

Inclusions: Local English-speaking guide, entrance into Princess Ljubica's Residence, coffee and a shot of rakia, tasting of

kaymak at the green market, street food sausages for lunch.

Exclusions: Additional food and drinks, souvenirs and items of a personal nature, tips/gratuities for your guide.

Full Itinerary

Your Belgrade tour will first lead you to Belgrade Cathedral – St Michael's Church, which holds relics of one of the most important Serbian leaders of the 19th century: Prince Miloš Obrenović. Meanwhile, in front of the church are the tombs of Vuk Karadžić, a Serbian philologist and linguist who established the modern Serbian alphabet, and Dositej Obradović, another linguist and a philosopher, as well as the first minister of education of Serbia. These two men had the biggest influence on Serbia's educational development and literacy programs, and will set the tone for our tour from historic to modern-day Belgrade.

Across the street from the church is the Patriarchate Building and on the opposite corner is Princess Ljubica's Residence; she was the wife of the aforementioned Prince Miloš Obrenović. We'll get to enter the residence and you'll learn more about 19th-century life in Serbia. (Please note that we cannot go inside the residence on Mondays.)

Nearby these two buildings you'll find the oldest traditional tavern in the city, built back in 1823. We'll have a coffee break here

and even indulge in some morning *rakia* (Serbian schnapps) as you listen to stories about Serbia's fight for freedom against the Turks. You can pick up a bit of the local language, too, as we'll also have a mini class on the Serbian alphabet.

After our short coffee break, your Belgrade tour continues through the city's main walking area, Knez Mihailova Street. We'll see the Belgrade library, Republic Square, and Serbia's Academy of Science and Art, and learn about the "between the wars" architecture that is so characteristic of Belgrade.

As we continue through the narrow streets of the old Dorcol neighbourhood, passing by the city's most popular cafés, restaurants, and bars, we'll reach a green market where locals sell homemade dairy and meat products, and fresh produce directly from their farms outside the city. White cheese, *kaymak* (similar to clotted cream), and *varci* (fried or roasted pork rind and fat) are some of the typical Balkan products that you'll find in this market. It's in markets such as this one where you'll get a true sense of what everyday life in Belgrade looks like.

From there, we'll go for a walk through Belgrade's bohemian quarter, Skadarlija street. This cobblestone street is a pedestrian zone filled with restaurants, bars, and traditional taverns. Here, we'll stop for a street food-style lunch at one of the best sausage joints in the city.

The tour ends after lunch in the city centre, at the Republic Square.

Inclusions: Local English-speaking guide, entrance into Princess Ljubica's Residence, coffee and a shot of rakia, tasting of kaymak at the green market, street food sausages for lunch.
